## English Education Option (56 units)

Students who complete the following will earn a B.A. in English: English Education Option and also satisfy subject matter preparation Program in English (SMPP) requirements. The SMPP is designed for students interested in a career in teaching English at the secondary school level (grades 6-12). This program satisfies the requirements set by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing for demonstrating substantive preparation in the subject matter field of English. Completion of this approved program or passing a comprehensive examination in English fulfills one part of the requirements leading to the Single Subject teaching Credential in English. Students interested in pursuing a teaching career at the secondary level should meet regularly with their departmental advisors.

All English Education option majors must complete the 41 upper division units of core requirements given below. In addition, all students must select one of the four fields of extended Studies (Communications, Literature, Teaching English as a Second Language, Theatre Arts) and complete the 15 units worth of requirements in that field. The English Education Option is a single-field major.

## Portfolio and Exit Interview

- Submission of a portfolio of assignments in literature, composition, language and linguistics, and from their option, and a self-reflective essay of 3-4 pp.
- An interview with a panel of faculty members from the English Department. This panel will certify completion of the Subject Matter Preparation Program in English.

## Program Learning Outcomes

## BA English: Literature and Education

- Knowledge Base: Literary Studies. Students will demonstrate knowledge of British, American, transnational, and world literatures, including works by major authors and major movements in literary history. Students will be able to identify and discuss various features of literary traditions and genres (poetry, fiction, drama), while showing
awareness of developments in language and literature brought about by social, historical, and cultural changes. Students will demonstrate knowledge of literature from historically underrepresented groups and texts that expand traditional ideas of the literary canon. (ILO 4, 5)
- Critical Analysis. Students will demonstrate the ability to read literary texts on different levels, starting with literal comprehension and moving to aesthetic responsiveness, awareness of literary traditions, and critical analysis. Students will be able to describe a given text's formal qualities and historical, cultural, and literary contexts that inform it, and students will apply those contexts in interpretations of texts. Students will analyze literary texts from a variety of critical and theoretical perspectives, applying one or more methodologies in their critical interpretations of literary texts. (ILO 1, 2, 4, 5)
- Effective Communication. Students will produce oral presentations and formal and informal writing in a variety of forms. Student work will analyze and respond to literary and critical texts and student writing. Students will observe the conventions of distinct writing genres and standard written English. Students will construct arguments by formulating a thesis, supporting it with appropriate evidence, and developing an argument through effective organization. Student writing will consistently demonstrate awareness of the conventions of written literary analysis and communicate effectively in one or more linguistic register. (ILO 1, 2, 4, 5)
- Research Skills. Students will produce literary analyses informed by independent research. Students will locate and evaluate appropriate sources, both print and electronic, and both primary and secondary, for the study of given texts. In writing, students will demonstrate their ability to use these sources effectively to build and support a cogent and persuasive argument. Students will document sources ethically and appropriately. (ILO 1,2,3)


## For English: Education only

- Extended Studies. Students will demonstrate knowledge of an extended studies area in TESL, Theatre Arts, Communication, or Literature. (ILO 1,2,5)
- Knowledge Base: Pedagogy. Students will demonstrate knowledge of composition pedagogy and reflect on and articulate their experiences as English teachers in training, both in writing and orally. (ILO 4,5)


## BA English: Linguistics

- Knowledge Base: Linguistics. Students will apply and evaluate multiple models of language. Students will respond critically to linguistic scholarship and utilize appropriate sources in constructing critical arguments about language. (ILO 1, 2, 3, 4)
- Effective Communication. Students will write discipline-appropriate reviews and research, using appropriate sources and documentation standards. In both individual and collaborative assignments, student will produce course-appropriate projects and papers. Students will present work orally in a discipline-appropriate format. (ILO 1, 2, 3, 4)
- Appreciation of Diversity. Students will analyze data from a diverse variety of languages. Students will identify and analyze examples of language's impact on society and society's impact on language. (ILO $1,2,3,4,5)$
